Summer Learning Projects

1. Bible – Student Bible Study

- Students are encouraged to spend time reading and studying God's Word.
- A student Bible study is available on RightNow Media titled "[Psalm 119](#)", focusing on the power of God's Word in the lives of believers.
- A study guide is also available to download on the website to help students as they complete this study.

2. English

- Choose **two books** that meet the following criteria:
 - a. **Fiction (150+ pages):** Explore a new world through a novel (graphic novels are prohibited).
 - Check out the "Booklist for Grades 9-12" on Christianbook.com (excluding titles mentioned above).

 - b. **Nonfiction (100+ pages, text-based):** Learn something new! Choose a biography, self-help book, current events book, or Christian living book.
 - Explore works by Malcolm Gladwell, Mitch Albom, C.S. Lewis, etc.
- **Important Note:** Several titles are unavailable for this assignment since we will be reading/have read them in class. These include:
 - Animal Farm
 - The Boy in the Striped Pajamas
 - The Lord of the Flies
 - The Great Gatsby
 - To Kill a Mockingbird
 - Night
 - The Scarlet Letter
 - Romeo and Juliet
 - Pride and Prejudice

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- **Analyze Your Reads (both books required):**
 - a. **Fiction:** List or type the letters A-Z on paper. For each letter, write a sentence summarizing the book or reflecting on your reading experience.
 - b. **Non-Fiction:** Write a one-page typed letter explaining what you learned and why someone should or shouldn't read the book.
- **Due Date: Assignments are due the first day of school - August 25, 2025.**
- Assignments will count as an English test grade.
